**APPLETON-LE-STREET** is a township and village, distant 3½ miles west-north-west from Malton. It consists of the townships of Amotherby, Broughton, Hildesley, and Swinton, also the hamlet of Easthorpe, in the Ryedale wapentake, Malton union, North Riding of the county, Bulmer deanery, Cleveland archdeaconry, and York archbishopric; it is situated on the old road from Hovingham to Malton. The church of All Saints' is a very ancient stone building, in the Norman style. The living is a vicarage, worth £600 yearly, in the gift of Rev. J. J. Peach; Rev. Charles Pierrepont Cleaver, M.A., is the incumbent. The population of the township, in 1851, was 183, and the acreage is 1,140. The soil is various, being partly clay and sandy; the subsoil is limestone. A. C. B. Creswell, Esq., is lord of the manor and chief landowner. There are charities of £3 10s. yearly value.

**BROUGHTON** is a township in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, 1½ miles north-west from Malton, in the division of Ryedale, Malton union, and in the North Riding. The soil and subsoil are clay and limestone. Thomas Isherwood, Esq., is lord of the manor. The chief landowners are the lord of the manor, Thomas Walker, John Williamson, Walter Strickland, George Wright, and Thomas Ety, Esqrs. This was a Roman settlement. The area is 855 acres, and the population, in 1851, was 97.

**HAZEL HOUSE** and **Musley Bank** are places here.

**EASTHORPE** is a hamlet, in the parish of Appleton-le-

Street, 3½ miles west from Malton, in the North Riding, and Malton union. The acreage is 745. The soil is limy and clayey; the subsoil is oolitic limestone and clay. Baker Creswell, Esq., is lord of the manor, and Lord Carlisle and Lord Fitzwilliam are the chief landowners. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley, &c.

**Bog Hall** is a place here.

**HILDENLEY** is a small township in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, 2 miles west-by-south from Malton, in the North Riding, Ryedale wapentake, and Malton union. The population, in 1851, was 30, and the acreage is 270. The soil is limy and clayey; the subsoil is limestone rock and clay. Sir George Strickland is the chief landowner.

**SWINTON** is a township and village, in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, three-quarters of a mile south-east from Amotherby, and 2 west-by-north from Malton, in the North Riding, Ryedale wapentake, and Malton union. There is a chapel for Wesleyans, and a school for boys and girls. The population, in 1851, was 387, and the acreage is 1,200. The soils are limestone, rock, and clay. Cornelius Culey, Esq., is lord of the manor. The chief landowners are the lord of the manor, William Fewster, Walter Strickland, Richard Moorsom, George Thompson and Edward Burton, Esqrs., and Mrs. Bentley. The chief crops are wheat, &c.

Swinton Grange, distant half a mile, and Highfield, half a mile, are places here.

**ARGAM, or EREHAM,** is a township and parish, 5 miles north-west from Bridlington, in the wapentake of Dickering, Bridlington union, archdeaconry of the East Riding, and archbishopric of York; it contains 510 acres of land, the property of Yarbrough Lloyd, Esq., and Mr. Thomas Bell. The population, in 1851, was 40, and the

**ARKENCARTHDAL** is a township and parish, in the date of the same name, situated on the Richmond, Reeth, and Brough road, about 10 miles south from Barnard Castle, and 14 west from Richmond, in the West Gilling division of the North Riding, Reeth union, Richmond archdeaconry, Ripon bishopric, York archbishopric. It comprises the hamlets of Arkle or Arketown, Longthwaite, Booze, Ushaw, High Green, Seal Houses, Eskeylith, and Dale Head, from the latter of which the parish com-

mences, and extends 7 or 8 miles in a south westerly direction. The church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a neat stone building, erected in 1818, and has a tower with 3 bells. It contains monuments to the memory of the late George Brown, Esq., and the Rev. John Gilpin, and a smaller one to Mrs. Jemima Gilpin, his wife. The living is a perpetual curacy, held by the Rev. John Hayton who resides at the parsonage-house. The Wesleyan Methodists have two chapels in the parish. There is an

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area 510 acres. There is now no place of worship here, the church having been taken down, but it is a sinecure rectory, anciently appertaining to Hunmanby. The Rev. Jabez Banks is rector, and C. Grimston, Esq., patron; the annual value is only £21. The place is sometimes described as extra-parochial.
