APPLETON-LE-STREET is a village and parish, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles west-north-west from Malton, and one mile west from Amotherby station. It consists of the townships of AMOTHERBY, BROUGHTON, HILDENLEY, and SWINTON, also the hamlet of EASTHORPE, in the Ryedale wapentake, Malton union and county court district, Bulmer rural deanery, Cleveland archdeaconry, and York diocese, situated on the old road from Hovingham to Malton. The church of All Saints is a very ancient stone building in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, porch, and square tower at the west end, which is very ancient, with probably a Saxon arch and foundation, the upper windows being Norman. It was restored and resealed by the vicar in 1855. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £600, with residence, in the gift of, and held by, the Rev. Charles Pierrepont Peach, B.A., of Magdalene College, Cambridge; the Rev. James Robertson, B.A., of St. John's College, Cambridge, is the curate. There are charities of £50 Hs. yearly value; also 20 acres of land as endowment for the National school of the parish. Oswin Cumming Baker Cresswell, esq., is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is partly clay and sandy; the subsoil is limestone and sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley, and pasture. The population of the township in 1871 was 182, and the acreage is 818; gross estimated rental, £1,277; rateable value, £1,144.

APPLETON-UPON-WISK is the extreme township and chapelry in that part of Cleveland which runs out into a narrow point towards the west, 7 miles from Yarm, 8 miles north-by-west from Northallerton, 10 miles west from Stokesley,

and about 3 miles from the Pickering station on the North Eastern Railway, going north, and about the same distance from the Welbourn station, going south. It is a township in the union and county court district of Northallerton, west
