**APPLETON-LE-STREET** is a parish and village on the old road from Hovingham to Malton, 1 mile west from Amotherby station on the Thirsk and Malton branch of the North Eastern railway, and 3½ west-north-west from Malton. The ecclesiastical parish consists of the townships of Amotherby (which will be found under a separate heading), Broughton, Hildenley and Swinton, also the hamlet of Easthorpe, in the Thirsk and Malton division of the Riding, Ryedale wapentake, Malton union, petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Helmsley, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. The church of All Saints is an ancient building of stone, in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, north porch and a western tower containing 4 bells; the foundation and some part of the base of the tower are probably of Saxon date; the church was restored and re-seated in 1855 by the late Rev. Charles Pierrepoint Peach B.A. then vicar, to whose memory a stained window was erected in 1886 by the parishioners; the roof was restored in 1904; there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a vicarage, with Amotherby annexed, net yearly value £386, including 267 acres of glebe, in the gift of Mrs. Peach, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Henry Ward B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge, who resides at Amotherby. The impropriate tithes amount to £215. There are charities of £3 10s. yearly value. Mr. James Arthur Fairbank, who is lord of the manor, and Mr. N. P. Fairbank, Miss S. E. Fairbank and Mrs. M. Wilson are the principal landowners. The soil is partly clay and sandy; the subsoil is limestone and clay sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley and some land in pasture. The population of the civil parish, inclusive of the hamlet of Easthorpe in 1901 was 146, and the ecclesiastical parish, 889; the acreage of the civil parish, inclusive of the hamlet of Easthorpe, is 1,633 acres; rateable value, £1,779.

**EASTHORPE** is a hamlet, 3½ miles west from Malton. Easthorpe Hall is the residence of the Hon. Francis Herbert Dawnay. The Earl of Carlisle is lord of the manor and the chief landowner. The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil is limestone and clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

**HILDENLEY** is a small township in this parish, 3 miles west-by-south from Malton. Hildenley Hall is the seat of Sir Charles William Strickland bart. D.L., J.P. lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil is limestone, rock and clay. The acreage is 304; rateable value, £365; the population in 1901 was 68.

**SWINTON** is a township and village in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, three-quarters of a mile south-east from Amotherby station and 2 north-west from Malton. There are Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. The Rev. Canon A. W. Headlam M.A. of Whorlton Hall, Darlington, who is lord of the manor, Captain Clive Behrens, John Harrison Preston esq. of Burythorpe, Robert Metcalfe esq. of Malton, and Albert T. Smith esq. are the chief landowners. Swinton Grange, distant half a mile, is the residence of Captain Clive Behrens. The soils are limestone, rock and clay; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat and barley, and there is some land in pasture. The acreage is 1,235; rateable value, £1,998; the population in 1901 was 314.

**ARKENGARTHALE** is a township and parish, in the dale of the same name, on the Richmond, Reeth and Brough road, 9 miles north-west from Redmire railway station on the Northallerton and Hawes branch of the North Eastern railway, about 10 south from Barnard Castle, 14 west from Richmond, and 4 north-west from Reeth, in the Richmond division of the Riding, West Gilling wapentake and petty sessional division, Reeth union, county court district of Richmond, rural deanery of West Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and diocese of Ripon. The Arkle Beck flows through the parish, which extends 7 or 8 miles in length. The church of St. Mary, erected in 1818, in the centre of the dale, about a quarter of a mile from Longthwaite, which is the largest village in the dale, is a plain building of stone, consisting of a rectangular nave with a quasi chancel, south porch and an embattled western tower containing 3 bells and a clock with two dials; there are monuments to George Brown esq. and to the Rev. John Gilpin, and Jemima, his wife. There are 344 sittings. The register dates from the year 1729, and has a few entries from an earlier book no longer in existence; the oldest of these entries is dated 1659. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £150, including 29 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the trustees of the late Right Hon. James Lowther P.C. M.P. and held since 1903 by the Rev. Harry Straker M.A. L.Th. of Hatfield Hall, Durham. The Wesleyan chapel at Longthwaite was erected in 1882, at a cost of £1,000; the old chapel is now used as a Sunday school, and during the week serves as a reading room for the members of the Literary Institute. Lead was formerly obtained here in large quantities, but the working of it has now ceased. There are smelting and saw mills in connection with the mines; coal and slate are also found.
