is a village and ecclesiastical parish, 15 miles north-west from the civil parish of North Eastern railway, 15 miles north-east from division of the Riding, 1 mile, Kirby Moorside union, Kinsley, rural deanery of Cleveland and diocese of York. ET is a parish and village 1 mile west from Malton, 1 mile west from Thirsk and Malton branch road, and 3½ miles west-north-west. APPLETON-UPON-WISKE, in Domesday "Apsi-tum" is the extreme township and a parochial chapelry in Great Smeaton ecclesiastical parish, in that part of Cleveland which runs out into a narrow point towards the west, 7 miles south from Yarm, 8 north from Northallerton, 10 west from Stokesley and about 3½ miles south from the Pickton station on the North Yorkshire and Cleveland branch of the North Eastern railway, and about 6 miles north-west from the Welburn station: it is in the Cleveland division of the Riding, petty sessional division of Thornaby and Yarm, union and county court district of Northallerton, west division of Langbaurgh liberty, rural deanery of East Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond, and diocese of Ripon. The Wisk, a rivulet, runs close to the village. The church of St. Mary, which stands in the western part of the village, is a small but ancient edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a western turret containing one bell; it was thoroughly repaired in 1875 and affords 100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a vicarage annexed to the rectory of Great Smeaton, joint net yearly value £448, in the gift of and held since 1899 by the Rev. Peter Elwin Wrench, who resides at Great Smeaton. In the village there are Congregational, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. The manor after the Conquest belonged to Robert de Brus, Lord of Skelton, who gave it with Hornby and other lands to St. Mary's Abbey, York. After the Dissolution, Henry VIII, granted it to Charles Brandon, afterwards Duke of Suffolk, whence it passed through many hands. Sir Henry Spencer Moreton Havelock-Alan bart. of Blackwell Grange, Darlington, is lord of the manor. Robert Routledge esq. and Joshua Dawson esq. are the chief landowners. The soil is clayey; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and beans. The area is 1,865 acres; rateable value, £2,293; the population in 1911 was 318.

ARKENGARTHDALE is a township and parish, in thedale of the same name, on the Richmond, Reeth and Brough road, 9 miles north-west from Bedlington railway station on the Northallerton and Hawes branch of the North Eastern railway, about 10 south from Barnard Castle, 14 west from Richmond, and 4 north-west from Reeth, in the Richmond division of the Riding, West Gilling wapentake and petty sessional division, Reeth union, county court district of Richmond, rural deanery of West Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and diocese of Ripon. The Arkle Beck flows through the parish, which extends 7 or 8 miles in length. The church of St. Mary, erected in 1813, in the centre of	and held since 1911 by the Rev. Ernest Montague Thompson M.A. of Durham University. Lead is obtained here. There are saw mills in connection with the mines; coal and slate are also found. George Thomas Gilpin-Brown esq. D.L., J.P. of Scar House, who is lord of the manor, and the Peacock family are the principal landowners. The soil is loamy, chiefly moorland and grass. The area is 14,556 acres of land and 21 of water; rateable value, £3,900; the population in 1911 was 363.
