APPLETON EAST and WEST, see Catterick.

APPLETON-LE-MOORS is a village and ecclesiastical parish, formed September 15th, 1868, from the civil parish of Lastingham; it is $\frac{3}{4}$ miles north-west from Sinnington station on the London and North Eastern railway, $\frac{1}{2}$ north-north-west from Malton and $\frac{3}{4}$ north-east from Kirby Moorside, in the Thirsk and Malton division of the Riding, petty sessional division of Ryedale, Kirby Moorside rural district, county court district of Helmsley, rural deanery of Helmsley, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. Christ Church, built as a memorial to J. Shepherd esq. by his widow, at a cost (including schools) of nearly £12,000, is a handsome building of stone in the Early English style, erected from the designs of J. L. Pearson esq. R.A., F.S.A. and consists of apsidal chancel, nave of three bays, aisles, vestry, west porch, and a tower at the south-east angle, 14 feet square, surmounted by a spire 50 feet in height, and containing a clock and 6 bells: the Shepherd memorial chapel has stained windows illustrating the six Acts of Mercy described in Matthew xxv and there are a number of other stained windows, chiefly memorials, and including one to the Rev. John Cass Graves B.A. incumbent of Laxton, Northants, from 1837, d. 1859: there is a double sedile on the south side of the chancel and a reredos of Caen stone, containing in the centre a representation

in sgraffito work of the Lord's Supper: a low wall of Caen stone separates the nave and chancel and supports an iron screen of delicate scroll work upon which is a brass lectern: the circular pulpit is divided by shafts into seven panels, upon which are incised standing figures of Noah, Moses, Jonah, Elijah, John the Baptist, St. Paul and St. Peter: there are 180 sittings. The register dates from the year 1869. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £333, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of York, and held since 1919 by the Rev. Francis Clifford Endecott B.Sc. of London University. Here is a Methodist chapel and a reading room, erected in 1911. Appleton Hall, a spacious and modern mansion of stone, near the church, is the residence of Miss Shepherd. The trustees of the late Henry Darley esq. (d. 1904) are lords of the manor. The land is held by many freeholders. The soil is principally limestone and clay, but varies in different parts; subsoil, sandy clay. The chief crops are barley and oats. The area is 1,322 acres; the population in 1921 was 196.

APPLETON-LE-STREET is a parish and village on the old road from Hovingham to Malton, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west from Amotherby station on the Thirsk and Malton branch of the London and North Eastern railway, and $\frac{3}{4}$ west-north-west from Malton. The ecclesiastical parish consists of the townships of Amotherby (which will be found under a separate heading), Broughton, Hildenley and Swinton, also the hamlet of Easthorpe, in the Thirsk and Malton division of the Riding, Ryedale wapentake, rural district, petty sessional division, county court district and rural deanery of Malton, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. The church of All Saints is an ancient building of stone in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, north porch and a western tower containing 2 bells: the foundation and some part of the base of the tower are probably of Saxon date: the church was restored and re-seated in 1855 by the late Rev. Charles Pierrepont Peach B.A. then vicar, to whose memory a stained window was erected in 1886 by the parishioners: the stained east window and a brass tablet in the chancel were erected in 1904 in memory of the late James and W. H. Fairbank esqrs. and Mrs. James Fairbank: the oak panelling in the chancel was presented in 1912 in memory of Mrs. Peach: the roof was restored in 1904: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a vicarage, with Amotherby annexed, joint net yearly value £506, with residence, in the gift of Mrs. Peach, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Henry Ward B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge, and canon of York, who resides at Amotherby. There are charities of £3 10s. yearly value. The trustees of

the late Mr. James Arthur Fairbank are lords of the manor (which comprises the sub-manors of Amotherby, Broughton and Swinton). Mr. J. Fairbank, Mrs. M. E. Vasey, Mrs. M. Wilson, Mr. N. H. Fairbank and Mr. G. W. Fairbank are the principal landowners. The soil is partly clay and sandy; the subsoil is limestone and clay sand. The chief crops are wheat, barley and some land in pasture. The population of the civil parish, inclusive of the hamlet of Easthorpe, in 1921 was 119, and of the ecclesiastical, 966; the acreage of the civil parish, inclusive of the hamlet of Easthorpe, is 1,633 acres.

EASTHORPE is a hamlet, $\frac{3}{4}$ miles west from Malton. Easthorpe Hall is the residence of Lord Grimthorpe T.D. Capt. Hon. Geoffrey William Algernon Howard J.P. (lord lieut.) is lord of the manor. The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil, oolitic limestone and clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

BROUGHTON is a township in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-west from Malton. This was a Roman settlement. The chief landowners are the trustees of the late John Potter and the trustees of the late Mrs. Wright. The soil and subsoil are clay and limestone. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 866 acres; the population in 1921 was 125.

HILDENLEY is a small township in this parish, $\frac{3}{4}$ miles west-by-south from Malton. Capt. Eric Geoffrey Dawnay is lord of the manor and sole landowner.

The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil is limestone. rock and clay. The acreage is 304; the population in 1921 was 49.

SWINTON is a township and village in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, three-quarters of a mile south-east from Amotherby station and 2 north-west from Malton. There are Methodist chapels. Swinton Grange, distant half a mile, is the residence of Major Clive Behrens

D.L., J.P. who is the chief landowner. The soils are limestone, rock and clay; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat and barley, and there is some land in pasture. The acreage is 1,255; the population in 1921 was 418.

APPLETON-UPON-WISKE, in Domesday "Apet-
tune," is the extreme township and a parochial chapelry in
Great Smeaton ecclesiastical parish, in that part of
Cleveland which runs out into a narrow point towards
the west, 7 miles south from Yarm, 8 north from North-
allerton, 10 west from Stokesley and about 3½ miles
south from the Picton station on the North Yorkshire
and Cleveland branch of the London and North Eastern
railway, and about 2½ miles north-west from the Wel-
bury station: it is in the Richmond division of the
Riding, petty sessional division of Thornaby and Yarm,
rural district and county court district of Northallerton,
west division of Langbaurgh liberty, rural deanery
of East Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and dio-
cese of Ripon. The Wiske, a rivulet, runs close to the
village. The church of St. Mary, which stands in the
western part of the village is a small but ancient edifice
of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and
a western turret containing one bell: it was thoroughly
repaired in 1875 and affords 100 sittings. The register

dates from the year 1520. The living is a vicarage
annexed to the rectory of Great Smeaton, joint net
yearly value £710, including 40 acres of glebe, in the
gift of Sir G. A. King-Harman K.C.M.G. and held
since 1930 by the Rev. James Frederick Cotton, who
resides at Great Smeaton. In the village there are
Methodist chapels. The manor after the Conquest be-
longed to Robert de Brus, Lord of Skelton, who gave it
with Horaby and other lands to St. Mary's Abbey, York.
After the Dissolution, Henry VIII. granted it to Charles
Brandon, afterwards Duke of Suffolk, whence it passed
through many hands. Sir Henry Spencer Moreton
Havelock-Allan bart. D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor.
Miss Ada M. Routledge is the principal landowner.
The soil is clayey; subsoil, clay. The chief crops
are grass, wheat, barley, oats and beans. The area
is 1,865 acres; the population in 1921 was 319.
