**APPLETON-LE-STREET** is a parish and village on the old road from Hovingham to Malton, 1 mile west from Amotherby station on the Thirsk and Malton branch of the London and North Eastern railway, and 3½ west-north-west from Malton. The ecclesiastical parish consists of the townships of Amotherby (which will be found under a separate heading), Broughton, Hildenley and Swinton, also the hamlet of Easthorpe, in the Thirsk and Malton division of the Riding, Ryedale wapentake, rural district, petty sessional division, county court district and rural deanery of Malton, archdeaconry of Cleveland and diocese of York. The church of All Saints is an ancient building of stone in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, north porch and a western tower containing 2 bells: the foundation and some part of the base of the tower are probably of Saxon date: the church was restored and reseated in 1855 by the late Rev. Charles Pierrepont Peach B.A., then vicar, to whose memory a stained window was erected in 1886 by the parishioners: the stained east window and a brass tablet in the chancel were erected in 1904 in memory of the late James and W. H. Fairbank esqrs. and Mrs. James Fairbank; in the east window of the south aisle is a medieval shield of the Greystock family: there is a 13th century stone effigy of a lady, with the arms of the Colton family and on the south wall is an effigy of a lady of the 18th century: the oak panelling in the chancel was presented in 1912 in memory of Mrs. Peach: the roof was restored in 1904: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1680. The living is a vicarage, with Amotherby annexed, joint net yearly value £474, with residence, in the gift of the Archbishop of York, and held since 1935 by the Rev. Cecil Willoughby Poignand M.A. of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, who resides at Amotherby. There are charities of £3 rovs. yearly value. The trustees of the late Mr. James Arthur Fairbank are lords of the manor (which comprises the sub-manors of Amotherby, Broughton and Swinton). Mr. J. Fairbank, Mrs. M. E. Vasey, Mrs. M. Wilson, Mr. N. H. Fairbank and Mr. G. W. Fairbank are the principal landowners. The soil is partly clay and sandy; the subsoil is limestone, rock and clay and sand. The chief crops are wheat and barley and there is some land in pasture. The population of the civil parish, inclusive of the hamlet of

**EASTHORPE** is a hamlet, ½ miles west from Malton. Easthorpe Hall is the residence of Lord Grimthorpe T.D., D.L. The trustees of the late Capt. Hon. Geoffrey William Algernon Howard J.P. are lords of the manor. The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil, oolithic limestone and clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and barley.

**BROUGHTON** is a township in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, ½ miles north-west from Malton. This was a Roman settlement. The chief landowners are the trustees of the late John Potter and the trustees of the late Mrs. Wright. The soil and subsoil are clay and limestone. The chief crops are wheat and barley. The area is 854 acres: the population in 1931 was 105.

By the North Riding of Yorkshire Review Order, 1934, a detached part of this township was transferred to Swinton.

**HILDENLEY** is a small township in this parish, 3 miles west-by-south from Malton. Capt Eric Geoffrey Dawnay is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is limey and clayey; the subsoil is limestone, rock and clay. The acreage is 304; the population in 1931 was 40.

**SWINTON** is a township and village in the parish of Appleton-le-Street, three-quarters of a mile south-east from Amotherby station and 2 north-west from Malton. There are Methodist chapels. Swinton Grange, distant half a mile, is the residence of Hon. Mrs. Clive Behrens J.P. who is the chief landowner. The soils are limestone, rock and clay; subsoil, various. The chief crops are wheat and barley and there is some land in pasture. The acreage is 1,267; the population in 1931 was 431.

By the North Riding of Yorkshire Review Order, 1934, a detached part of Broughton was added.

**APPLETON-UPON-WISKE**, in Domesday "Apel-tune," is the extreme township and a parochial chapelry in Great Smeaton ecclesiastical parish, in that part of Cleveland which runs out into a narrow point towards the west, 7 miles south from Yarm, 8 north from Northallerton, 10 west from Stokesley and about 3½ miles south from the Pickton station on the North Yorkshire and Cleveland branch of the London and North Eastern railway, and about 2½ miles north-west from the Welburn station: it is in the Richmond division of the Riding, petty sessional division of Thornaby and Yarm, rural district and county court district of Northallerton, west division of Langbaurgh liberty, rural deanery of East Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and diocese of Ripon. The Wiske, a rivulet, runs close to the village. The church of St. Mary, which stands in the western part of the village is a small but ancient edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a western turret containing one bell: it was thoroughly repaired in 1875 and affords 100 sittings. **ARKENGARTHDALE** is a township and parish, in the dale of the same name, on the Richmond, Reeth and Brough road, 9 miles north-west from Redmire railway station on the Northallerton and Hawes branch of the London and North Eastern railway, about 10 south from Barnard Castle, 14 west from Richmond, and 4 north-west from Reeth, in the Richmond division of the Riding, West Gilling wapentake and petty sessional division, Reeth rural district, county court district of Richmond, rural deanery of West Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and diocese of Ripon. The Arkle Beck flows through the parish, which extends 7 or 8 miles in length. The church of St. Mary, erected in 1815, in the centre of the dale, about a quarter of a mile from Langthwaite, which is the largest village in the dale, is a plain building of stone, consisting of a rectangular nave with a quasi chancel and an embattled, western tower containing 3 bells and a clock with two "dials"; there are monuments to George Brown esq. and to the Rev. John Gilpin, and Jemima, his wife. The church affords 344 sittings. The register dates from the year 1729, and has a longer history than exists.

**APPLETON-UPON-WISKE.** In Domesday "Apel-  
tune," is the extreme township and a parochial chapelry in  
Great Smeaton ecclesiastical parish, in that part of  
Cleveland which runs out into a narrow point towards  
the west, 7 miles south from Yarm, 8 north from North-  
allerton, 10 west from Stokesley and about  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles  
south from the Pickering station on the North Yorkshire  
and Cleveland branch of the London and North Eastern  
railway, and about  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles north-west from the Wel-  
bury station; it is in the Richmond division of the  
Riding, petty sessional division of Thornaby and Yarm,  
rural district and county court district of Northallerton,  
west division of Langbaurgh liberty, rural deanery  
of East Richmond, archdeaconry of Richmond and di-  
ocese of Ripon. The Wiske, a rivulet, runs close to the  
village. The church of St. Mary, which stands in the  
western part of the village is a small but ancient edifice  
of stone, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and  
a western tower containing one bell; it was thoroughly  
repaired in 1875 and affords 100 sittings. The register  
dates from the year 1620. The living is a vicarage  
annexed to the rectory of Great Smeaton, joint net  
yearly value £710, including 40 acres of glebe, in the  
gift of Sir C. A. King-Harman K.C.M.G. and held  
since 1930 by the Rev. James Frederick Cotton, who  
resides at Great Smeaton. In the village there are  
Methodist chapels. The manor after the Conquest be-  
longed to Robert de Brus, Lord of Skelton, who gave it  
with Hornby and other lands to St. Mary's Abbey, York.  
After the Dissolution, Henry VIII. granted it to Charles  
Brandon, afterwards Duke of Suffolk, whence it passed  
through many hands. Sir Henry Spencer Moreton  
Havelock-Allan bart. D.L., J.P. is lord of the manor.  
Miss Ada M. Routledge is the principal landowner.  
The soil is clayey; subsoil, clay. The chief crops  
are grass, wheat, barley, oats and beans. The area  
is 1,865 acres; the population in 1931 was 324.

**ARKENGARTHDALE** is a township and parish, in  
the dale of the same name, by the Richmond, Reeth and  
Brough road, 9 miles north-west from Redmire railway  
station on the Northallerton and Hawes branch of the  
London and North Eastern railway, about 10 south from  
Barnard Castle, 14 west from Richmond, and 4 north-  
west from Reeth, in the Richmond division of the Rid-  
ing, West Gilling wapentake and petty sessional division,  
Reeth rural district, county court district of Richmond,  
rural deanery of West Richmond, archdeaconry of Rich-  
mond and diocese of Ripon. The Arkle Beck flows  
through the parish, which extends 7 or 8 miles in  
length. The church of St. Mary, erected in 1818, in  
the centre of the dale, about a quarter of a mile from  
Langthwaite, which is the largest village in the dale,  
is a plain building of stone, consisting of a rectangular  
nave with a quasi chancel and an embattled western  
tower. There are three bays in the nave, each with two  
light windows. The tower is square, with a pyramidal  
cap. The interior consists of a nave and a chancel, and the  
tower is open. The register dates from 1662.

1729, and has a few entries from an earlier book no  
longer in existence; the oldest of these entries is dated  
1659. The living is a perpetual curacy, net yearly  
value £400, with residence, in the gift of Col. John  
George Lowther D.S.O., M.C., M.F.H., D.L., J.P. and  
held since 1930 by the Rev. Richard Alderson, of St.  
Paul's College, Burgh, L.Th. of University of Sas-  
katchewan, F.R.G.S. Lead was obtained here; coal and  
slate are also found. At the south side of the valley  
are the Hungry Chert quarries (worked by John S.  
Wagstaff), the produce of which is identical with that  
found on Halkyn Mountain, Holywell, North Wales. Col.  
Hon. Guy Greville Wilson C.M.G., D.S.O., T.D., D.L.,  
J.P. who is lord of the manor, and the Peacock family  
are the principal landowners. The soil is loamy, chiefly  
moorland and grass. The area is 14,556 acres of land  
and 21 of water; the population in 1931 was 545.

**ARKETOWN** is a small village about  $\frac{1}{2}$  miles north-  
west from Brough in Arkengarthdale.

It is 3 miles south-west from Brough.
